

# Coming in the Journal

he Winter 2021 issue (Volume 50, Number 2) of the Journal was published and distributed to members and subscribers shortly after the Christmas and New Year holiday, about a month later than usual, for which we do apologise. With Covid restrictions still in force, many of the processes involved in preparing and proofing articles, and in having the Journal printed and posted, took rather longer than expected. We hope that your enjoyment of it was worth the wait.

The Summer 2022 issue is now in preparation. Two new articles have already been received in draft: a study by Dr John N T Martin of 'Student societies in Edinburgh University from 1720 to 1970+', and an account by (sadly, the late) Dr Ian Wotherspoon of 'Scotland's people in Scotland's Empire', based on a talk that he gave to the New Club, Edinburgh, in 2017 which we are publishing by kind permission of Ian's family. We hope to include the Rector's address to the Annual Reception in March, articles on The Edinburgh Asia Institute, former Afro-Caribbean slaves who studied at the University, the Fermi Paradox and the Kardashev Scale, on setting up a film production studio for social change, and more. Several reviews, including one of Alistair Kerr's Tales for Twilight, will also be included in the Summer 2022 issue. We were, unfortunately, unable to publish some of these with the Winter 2021 issue due to space restrictions.

Two keynote articles from past volumes of the Journal have been suggested for possible reprint: an account by Alvin R Riggs of 'The Colonial American Medical Student at Edinburgh' from the Autumn 1961 issue, and one by Principal (later Sir) Edward Appleton on 'University Development' from the Autumn 1956 issue which details the University's postwar development plans, which largely came to fruition during the following 15 years and are still with us. These articles help to demonstrate the tremendous archival value to the University's heritage of the UEJ.

The Journal continues its publication in the Summer and the Winter and is made up of substantial

articles, reviews, and obituaries for members of the University community. Members are encouraged to consider writing for the Journal, particularly on matters of direct interest and content on aspects of the University's past, present and future. If you have an idea that you would like to write about but are not sure how to go about it, or if there is a topic connected with the University that you would like to read about in the *Journal*, do please contact the Editor, by email to gradassoc@ed.ac.uk or in writing to Journal Office at the Graduates' Association. Articles published in the *Journal* become part of the University's heritage.
